Classic Computer Recovery Inc has never exported hazardous material as the recycling company did in the 60 minutes piece entitled "The Wasteland" that aired on November 9, 2008. Exporting raw CRT tubes is not allowed by the EPA and we are very clear on that point. CCR has always used downstream partners for TVs, terminals, and POS monitors who recycle lead based glass items via Glass to Glass (g2g) Recycling. CCR has been doing this since 2003. G2G is the most "GREEN" way to recycle lead based glass. Lead based glass needs to be shipped as a whole unit for re-use or it needs to be processed thru G2G recycling. Glass to glass recycling involves canceling the glass, by breaking it into small pieces (furnace ready) separating the front panel glass from the funnel tube glass. 100% of the canceled glass is re-used by manufacturers in Asia to produce more CRT monitors & analog televisions for other countries still using analog technology. Another method of G2G recycling involves using a large machine that acts like a precision saw to make a clean break between the front panel glass and the funnel tube glass which also goes back to the same original electronic manufacturers of CRTs and TVs. Glass to Glass Recycling is the highest labor cost item to recycle in our industry with the lowest return but it is the best way to dispose of lead-based glass.

CCR exports specific product categories for asset recoverable items like working PCs, notebooks, monitors, and computers. We also export specific computer parts by product category, and 14"-19" monitors that are missing bases, or are too old for Re-sale. Finally we send P1, P2 and P3 complete systems out via export for metals scrap recovery. CCR has never shipped televisions or hazmat lead based glass like raw CRT tubes or broken glass units such as TVs or monitors out of the US. If you would like an updated listing of our downstream partners, they are available upon request.

In terms of total weight, 50% of what CCR collects stays in the United States for processing and commodity recovery which is largely made up of lead based glass items. Approximately 23% of the total weight on the average is sold all over the world as asset recoverable whole units and parts, and 37% of the total weight is e-scrap scrap commodity items which are sold by product category back to ASIA. The breakdown is as follows:

- 30% of the total weight is TVs, terminals, all in one unites, and small POS monitors which stay in the U.S and go to g2g companies who do proper processing and keep the materials in raw form by commodity.
- 15% of the weight is 14"-19" working monitors sold as asset recoverable items all over the world.
- 10% of the weight is copper, aluminum, plastic, metal, cable and wire and sold in the US only.
- 10% of the weight is printers of which 20% is recovered for parts or re-use and resold in the US and 80% of the weight is sold as scrap plastic and metal which US buyers and Asian buyers both recycle.
- 5% of the total weight is Asset recoverable systems/notebooks and servers which are sold all over the world.
- 10% of the system weight is scrap systems sold to Hong Kong or Malaysia.
- 15% of the total weight is AS IS monitors-not tested for working status because they are either too old (manufacturer date codes), missing base, cut cords or screen burn/scratched glass. These are always kept in whole unit form. Lead based glass is more protected from glass breakage when it is kept in whole form. All of this material is exported to Hong Kong, Malaysia or Vietnam.
- 2% of the total weight is Media: FD, CD, DVD drives, Drill pressed hard drives, Power supplies, stand by battery back ups, hubs, routers, switches, telephone switches, console phones, pos scanners, and memory and circuit boards which ships both to US and Canadian buyers as well as Asian buyers.
- 1% of the total weight is the same above items which are asset recoverable and sold all over the world.
- 2% of the weight is DVD players, VHS players, Computer Scanners, Microwaves which ships to ASIA.
- 2% is Stereo equipment, boom boxes, miscellaneous e-scrap (electronic games, toasters, blenders, hair dryers, vacuum cleaners etc) all of which is recycled as mixed plastic and metal and stays in the US.

In conclusion, there are new rules for CRT exports and new rules for e-scrap exports which we require our industry to register with the federal EPA informing them what products we are shipping, where and to whom. This requirement was mailed to our industry in October of 2008 and CCR Inc. is complying. If you have more questions feel free to E-mail us anytime.
